



Upcoming June Ballot Items for revote - These funds are already in the account and will NOT raise your dues.

We are asking the community to please reconsider repaving our main road as it is falling apart and we have already had to do 2 patches totaling close to \$1500 with another patch needed at roughly \$800. Our roads are going to nickel and dime us if we don't act now!

Repave Port Orford

The roads in the Pines are very old and are showing extreme wear from traffic, tree roots, and Mother Nature. The cost to repair all the roads at once will be extremely expensive. Therefore, we have decided to do one major road at a time. The contractor who examined the roads has determined that Port Orford is in the worst shape. It is also the most expensive road. The Board would like your approval to take approximately \$225,000 (which includes tax) from the Long Range Plan to redo Port Orford.

The construction would include:

- Pulverizing the existing pavement
- Regrade
- Place 3 ½ inches of hot asphalt mix on the regrade (approx. 10,572 square yards)
- Place shoulder rock
- Adjust water valves along the road
- Provide traffic control
- Replace the 4 speed bumps and restripe

Again, these funds are already in the account and will NOT raise your dues.

This project will draw the Long Range Plan down to about half, however, it will not affect the \$250,000 we are required to keep as security for our water loans.

We also ask that you reconsider purchasing new mowers, we understand that the diesel mowers were quite expensive, so we got new bids and are going to switch over to gas mowers.

Purchase Gas Mowers

The Pines currently has 3 mowers. The two smaller mowers are frequently in the shop for repairs because they are not sufficient to do the job in the Pines. We spent almost \$6,000 for repairs last year and just replaced a clutch for \$1500.

We would like to purchase two new gas mowers for approximately \$20,000. The current mowers will either be used as trade-ins or sold to the members or the public.

Again, these funds are already in the account and will NOT raise your dues.

Please keep an eye out for your June ballot and make sure you vote as it is very important to our community!

If you have questions or concerns, please come out to our next board meeting Wednesday May 20th at 6:30pm and ASK, we are happy to answer all questions!!



PUGET SOUND ENERGY Call 811 Before You Dig


As summer approaches, you may have plans to start constriction and landscaping projects. Your friends at Puget Sound Energy want to remind you about the importance of calling 811 at least two business days prior to any digging. It is the law, and utility-owned lines are located for free.

Whether you are planning to use your employees or hire a contractor, smart digging means calling 811 before each job. Outline your dig area in white paint so that the utilities will know where to mark. Even homeowners digging on their on property must call, if digging deeper than 12 inches.

Don't take a chance. Call 811 before you dig, then dig by hand within 2 feet of the markings.



Conserving Water




Summer is right around the corner, where we will want to fill our pools and plant our gardens

Here is a tip to conserve your money, due to the timing of our meter reading, fill half the pool before the 20th of the month and the other half after the 22nd of the month. That way you won't get hit with it all on 1 bill. Please don't through the hose into the pool, rather duct tape it to the to the top rim of the pool.

Water your garden in the early morning or in the evening, watering in the middle of the day can burn your plants or just evaporate.

Burning and Burn Permits



Please renew our burn permit. You can get one at the office or go online to ww.orcaa.org.

You may not burn treated, painted or stained wood, plywood, construction debris, paints, tires, and other rubber products, plastics, asphalt and building materials, chemicals, petroleum products, metal and dead animals.

Paper or newspaper (except what is necessary to start a fire), cardboard, and household garbage.


All wood has to be in it's natural form.

Fire may be no higher than 3ft.

Ecology home > Water Resources > Water conservation: It all starts with you

Water conservation: It all starts with you

Water conservation, using water efficiently and avoiding waste, is essential to ensure that we have adequate water today and into the future. Water is a finite resource and the supplies on Earth today are no more than what was here at the beginning of the planet. It is up to all of us to use the water we have wisely, and it is as simple as each of us making small changes. Make conserving water a daily part of your life. And remember when you save water, you save energy and money!



Indoors

Bathroom: What you can do behind closed doors

Over half the water use inside a home takes place in the bathroom.

- Turn off the water while shaving or brushing teeth. (Savings: up to 4 gallons a minute, or up to 200 gallons a week for a family of four!)
- Take short showers instead of tub baths; showers use less water. (If you keep your showers to under 5 minutes you'll save up to 1,000 gallons a month.)
- If you do take a bath, be sure to plug the drain right away and adjust the temperature as you fill the tub.
- Don't use your toilet as a wastebasket. Use a leak-free, high efficiency toilet. (Toilets are by far the main source of water use in the home: nearly 30 percent of residential indoor water consumption.)
- When washing your hands, turn off the water while you lather.

Kitchen: Cook up some real water savings

- Wash only full loads of dishes, and select the appropriate water level or load size option on the dishwasher.
- Do not use water to defrost frozen foods; thaw foods in the refrigerator overnight.
- Scrape, rather than rinse dishes before loading them into the dishwasher.
- Compost food waste instead of using the garbage disposal or throwing it in the trash.
- Keep drinking water in the refrigerator instead of letting the faucet run until the water is cool



Laundry: Rinse out some real money savings



- Wash only full loads of laundry or use the appropriate water level or load size selection on the washing machine.
- Consider purchasing a high efficiency washing machine, which can save over 50 percent in laundry water and energy use.

Fix leaks: Always and everywhere



• You can significantly reduce water use by simply repairing leaks in fixtures (faucets and showerheads), pipes, and tollets. A leaky faucet wastes gallons of water in a short period of time. A leaky tollet can waste 200 gallons per day. That would be like flushing your tollet more than 50 times for no reason!

Outdoors

Of the estimated 29 billion gallons of water used daily by households in the United States, nearly 9 billion gallons (30 percent) is used outdoors. In the hot summer months, or in dry climates, a household's outdoor water use can be as high as 70 percent.



- Native and drought tolerant plants can make a beautiful alternative to unused turf areas in your yard. <u>WSU Cooperative Extension</u> has many resources to assist home gardeners with landscaping using native plants.
- Purchase an inexpensive hose timer to avoid over-watering. Soaker hoses are also a great option for avoiding evaporation.
- Collecting rainwater to use on your landscape can help you save water outdoors.
- Many local water providers offer rebates on efficient irrigation devices.
- Use a broom or electric blower to clean driveways and sidewalks, rather than hosing them off.
- When washing your car, use an adjustable nozzle or sprayer and turn off the water stream while soaping your vehicle.

Hummingbird Nectar Recipe

Isn't it Sweet!

Here is a homemade hummingbird nectar recipe to use now that you have purchased several hummingbird feeders and decided where to hang them.

A Homemade Nectar Recipe:

- * Step 1: Bring 1 cup of water to a boil.
- * Step 2: Add 1/4 cup of white granulated sugar.
- * Step 3: Stir well until the sugar is dissolved.
- * Step 4: Boil this mixture for 2 minutes to help prevent it from spoiling too rapidly.
 - * Step 5: Allow to thoroughly cool.
 - * Step 6: Pour into a clean hummingbird feeder.

Tips:

- * Use a larger 4 parts water to 1 part sugar mixture to make a bigger batch of nectar.
 - * You can store the unused nectar in the refrigerator for 2 weeks.
- * Do not use honey as this can causes a fatal infection to a hummingbird's tongue.
- * Artificial sweeteners or sugars have no nutritional value. Please don't use them.
 - * Red dyes are not necessary and some may be unhealthy.
 - * Remember to clean your feeder regularly.
 - * Change the nectar once a week and more often in hot weather.
- * NOTE: A sugar water mixture can quickly ferment in the heat and sun causing bacteria and mold.

We have been using this nectar recipe for years and we have had many hungry birds at our feeders.

We hope your feeders will be as busy with hummingbirds enjoying this delectable treat!
